









here in 1829 as Belper Brook (shown a direct line down to the River Derwent. This detail marks out both the original course of the brook as it meanders down to the river, and the straightened version.

This early 19th century map shows the route of the River Derwent through Belper before the need for large quantities of water to work the waterwheels in the mills led to the building of the Horseshoe Weir in 1797. The pink area shows where the land flooded when the weir was created, thereby changing the landscape around the river through what is now the River Gardens.
